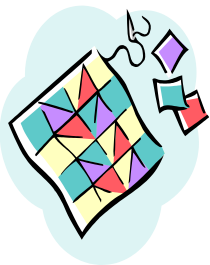

From the President

Time flies when you are having fun...

I truly believe this when I look back on how much enjoyment I've experienced during the past 3 years of leading the RKG.

And thanks to all of the ambitious Board Members and volunteers, we've had a blast dreaming up new programs, community service projects, and honing old traditions. As much fun as it has been, it is time to hand the reins over to new leadership. I for one can't wait to see what new ideas the next Board will explore.

At the March meeting we will be taking nominations for the elected officials, a slate will be presented at the April meeting, and elections will take place at our year end May meeting.

President

The main tasks of the President are to preside over the monthly meeting, facilitate the Board meetings, and propose a budget to the Board. However, I have found that the true role of the President is to master the art of delegation. I have been very fortunate to have such willing and able Board members. They have made this job EZ.

Vice President

The Vice President's responsibility is to arrange the monthly programs. While many of the programs are set by annual tradition, there are a few months where the sky is the limit! In the past, monthly programming has ranged from guest lectures, game night, to the ever favorite mini-workshops. Again, delegation is key. The VP does not need to present the programs but merely propose program ideas to the Board, and ask for help from the fiber community.

Secretary

Can you take notes? The main task of the Secretary is to summarize the minutes of each Board meeting. This is not a huge level of commitment and it's a great way to learn about how the Guild operates.

Treasurer

Are you good with numbers? For the past 3 years Nancy Harrington has been our Treasurer. The Treasurer deposits checks, pays the bills and summarizes the year end finances. Nancy is willing to work with the new Treasurer to show them the ropes.

The Directors shall hold office for two years, being elected on alternate years.

However, this year we have a vacancy in Director 2, so we will need to elect TWO Directors: Director 1 year term & Director 2 year term. The role of a Director is not clearly defined, which makes this position very flexible. If you have a special talent the Board will put you to good use. In past years the Directors were appointed to special committees, explored new initiatives, and organized the year end Fashion Show.

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Extreme Knitting I-cord Hat Pattern

Gather all your 50 yard leftover balls of sock yarn (fingering weight) in complementary colors and begin cranking through the Caron Embellish-Knit! Machine (i-cord maker). When you reach the end of your remnant or just wish to change colors, using a complementary color tie a square knot and trim the ends off at about 1/2 inch. Continue until you have created 60 yards of unstretched i-cord. Don't bother weaving in the ends of your tied together remnants. Most of them will get knit into the inside of the i-cord by the Embellish-Knit!

Size 19 straight or circular needles

Smooth waste yarn

Note: If you need to make your i-cord in more than one piece, the ends of the i-cord can be sewn together flush and the sewing yarn hidden inside the i-cord tube. You won't see it when the hat is finished.

Note two: When knitting the wrapped stitches, do not knit the wrap along with the stitch. It will not show because you are knitting garter stitch and would make the stitch much too bulky anyway.

Leaving a one yard tail of i-cord and using the waste yarn provisionally cast on 16 stitches.

All rows are knit (garter stitch)

Knit 16 stitches

Knit 15 stitches, W&T (wrap and turn) last stitch

K15 stitches

Knit 14 stitches, W&T second from last stitch

K14

Knit 13 stitches, W&T third from last stitch

K13

Knit 12 stitches, W&T fourth from last stitch

K12

Knit 11 stitches, W&T fifth from last stitch

K11

Knit 10 stitches, W&T sixth from last stitch

K10

Now begin adding a stitch every other row.

Knit 11 stitches, W&T next stitch

K11

Knit 12 stitches, W&T next stitch

K12

Knit 13 stitches, W&T next stitch

K13

Knit 14 stitches, W&T next stitch

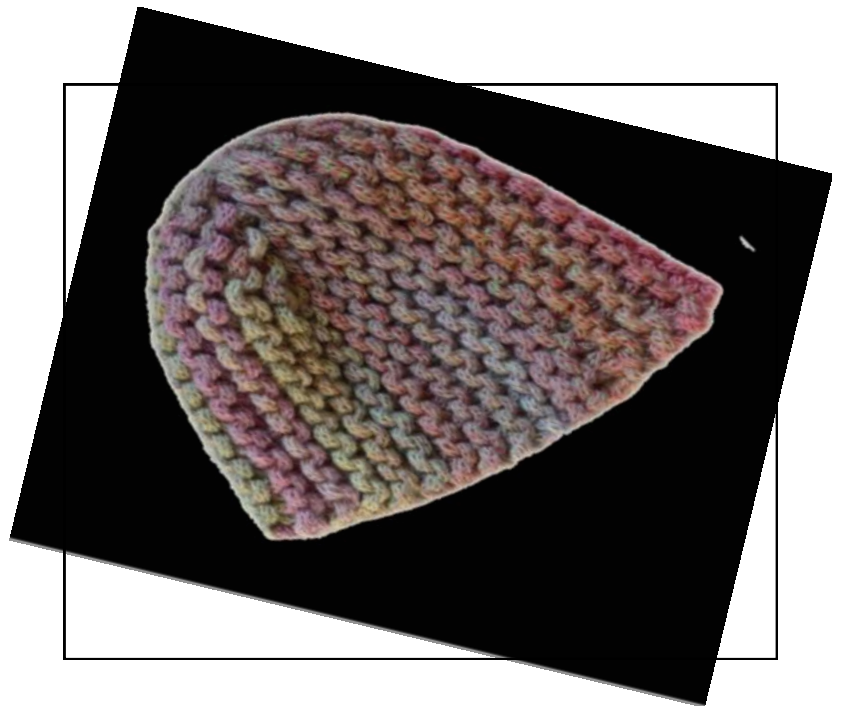
K14

Knit 15 stitches, W&T next stitch

K15

You will notice you have created a wedge. Repeat this process two more times. Knit an additional row knitting the 16th stitch and ending at the peak of the hat. Using the cast-on tail, graft the provisional cast-on stitches together with the last knit row. Weave in ends.

To make a smaller hat for a child reduce the number of stitches cast on and knit proportionately (approximately 14 cast-on stitches for a 4-5 year old. For a man-sized hat cast on 17 stitches and wrap 7.
