SUMMARY

Donna Druchunas Workshops

The Rochester Knitting Guild was delighted to host our Spring Workshop Instructor, Donna Druchunas, during the first week of April for four days of mostly sold-out classes.

Students in the *Stories in Stitches* classes learned a number of new stitch techniques such as the Bulgarian Cast On.

In *Grandma's Knitting*, we were challenged to think about knitting and purling in a way that mounted stitches differently. It certainly stretched our skills and sometimes our patience!

Saturday was a day-long class learning to knit a Bosnian style colorwork sock, starting with a completely new type of toe, and after learning some colorwork techniques, adding a Baltic Braid.

Sunday morning students were introduced to more colorwork techniques including a decorative fringe cast on for Latvian style mittens.

Sunday afternoon we were treated to learning traditional beading techniques to knit beautiful Latvian wrist warmers.

Monday morning, students took a deep dive into lace techniques and had a lot of hands-on practice making decreases leaning in every possible direction and style, and got an introduction to some of Dorothy Reade's lace techniques.

In the final Monday afternoon class, we learned about the unique features of Japanese patterns, how to read the patterns that appear in the "stitch bibles" we enjoy so much, and then had an opportunity to knit from a pattern. Most of us found it extremely challenging!

Hopefully many members were able to join us Monday evening for Donna's talk about Dorothy Reade's pioneering work in creating an innovative approach to lace patterns. We also learned about Reade's work with the Oomingmak Knitters' Cooperative in Alaska, teaching the members of the co-op to create lace patterns based on their traditional arts using Qiviut from native musk ox. 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

Library

This month I have very little to discuss since summer is fast approaching and there aren't any classes for me to coordinate with. I have decided to talk about lace for both knitting and crochet. Lace is not only used for shawls but also for clothing and project trimmings. Crochet is famous for lace doilies that decorated our homes as far back as the Victorian age. At present time the library holds 23 books with the topic of lace, whether it be the main subject or an article within the book.



The Formation of Lace Stitches & Lace Shorthand: In this video tape Sandy Terp demonstrates how to form the basic stitches used in lace knitting, as well as how the stitches are organized and kept track of with her Lace Shorthand. Sandy uses a knitted lace bookmark as a sampler and demonstrates a different group of techniques in each of three sections.

The Very Easy Guide to Lace Knitting: Step-by-Step Techniques, Easy-to-Follow Stitch Patterns, and Projects to Get You Started by Lynne Watterson.



Knitting Lace contains detailed directions to design and chart your own lace patterns. Information for machine knitters to convert hand-knitting charts to machine.

Mary Walker Phillips' Knitting Counterpanes nearly single-handedly brought 19th-century American counterpanes—bed coverings—to the attention of modern knitters. Expanded with dozens of brand-new charts. This revised edition
