It's Auction Night!

Auction

Thanks to many generous (and yarn-loving!) members of the Rochester Knitting Guild, there will be OVER 300 separate "lots" of yarn to bid upon at our annual Auction Night, Monday, May 13. As usual, our doors will open at 6:30, and Deb Abrahams, our knitting guru, will be available over the course of the evening to assist you with any knitting quandaries you may have.

Starting at 7 pm, we'll have our usual set of announcements and Show & Tell, after which the bidding will begin!!

Each lot of yarn—some all-wool, some blends, some cotton, some kits, and some "mystery" yarns that are nevertheless luscious (and of course, some ever-useful acrylic yarns)--will be stowed in a clear, zippered bag bearing a number identifying that particular selection of yarns. Nearby will be a bidding sheet, bearing the same Lot Number.

This is where YOU come in: take your time; inspect every lot; and encourage your friends to bid, too, on what appeals to them! Be sure to check back from time to time, to keep an eye on the lots that interest you most: it is possible that others will have outbid you but you are welcome to "up the game" by offering a bid for a larger amount, so long as your bid is in full dollar amounts! Remember, every bag of yarn you purchase represents a donation directly benefits the Rochester Knitting Guild, so don't be shy!

This year, we are adding a wonderful new twist, courtesy of the very hard work of our Community Knitting Coordinator, Pat Butterfield, who has been supremely helpful in organizing this year's auction: There will also be a table (or two?) filled with balls of unlabeled yarns, which you are welcome to choose without bidding on them. Simply tuck these balls into the bags provided—but sure to keep count! The guild will ask just \$1 for every four balls of yarn you buy and most balls are more than half a skein of that yarn!

At 8 pm, when the end of the auction is announced, simply collect the bidding sheets (and bag of yarn!) for each lot you have won, and turn to the cashiers who will be on hand. There will be cashiers accepting a) Venmo, b) checks, and c) good, old-fashioned cash. Report to the one willing to accept the tender you have on hand, and enjoy your bargain treasures!

Thanks again to everyone who has donated yarn, and everyone who takes some home on Monday, May 13 and most especially, Pat Butterfield, for organizing most of the yarns that will be available that night. Tips from the Help Table

Avoid "Yarn Chicken"

If you've been knitting for a while, you might well have played "Yarn Chicken". With just a few rows left to go, you're not sure if you have enough yarn to finish. So you hold your breath, and keep knitting.

But what if your uncertainty tolerance is low? Is there a way to know?

There is. But I keep mine in the kitchen, not in my knitting bag. It's my kitchen scale, which weighs in both ounces and grams.

With the scale set to "grams," you first weigh the remaining ball. Then knit one row, and weigh the ball again. Now you know the grams per row. Then, it's grams per row times number of remaining rows. If the product is more than the remaining yarn, you will need more yarn. If it's close, knit tightly to give yourself the best chance, or reduce the number of rows. And if the remaining yarn is more than enough, you're good to go worry-free.

The photo shows one such project. I needed 2 rows of 398 stitches each. But did I have enough yarn for two whole rows? (Yarn used doubled, pulled from both ends). My scale said no. But I had enough to cut one strand, and pair the other strand with a strand of a matching yarn. It was the scale that helped me figure out how to finish my shawl undetectably.
